Earlier this week I read an article about a baby girl born in Houston, Texas whose parents wanted to give her a special name. So - after a "great?" deal of thought - the mother of the little girl gave her a name which is 1,023 letters long! An amalgamation of 100 short first names, which includes hyphens which is recorded in the Guinness Book of World Records because of its length (obviously too long

to print here.) The article stated that registering her name in the registrar's office in Houston, Texas proved to be quite a challenging process which required the use of seven certificates glued and stapled together. It was such a laborious process that the registrar's office in Houston now prohibits the use of names that will not fit on two typewritten lines in the 5 1/8" space of a birth certificate.

While preparing for this week's 9:30 a.m. Palm Sunday service (which will be broadcast on Facebook), I thought about the name God gave to His Son. A five-letter name which is the greatest name above all and any other name, "Jesus". Our Savior, who's triumphant entry into Jerusalem we and millions of other Christians will celebrate this Sunday - regardless - and in spite of being "confined to our living quarters" - or - at a socially safe distance from each other because of the Coronavirus which unlike Jesus' love for us will never cease to be.

"Jesus." What's in a name? What's so special in and about <u>that</u> name? Comfort. Peace. Security. Safety. Healing. Caring. Calm. Love. Grace. Forgiveness. Hope for today, tomorrow and all of eternity. A name above and beyond any name in this life. A name at the sound of which every knee should bend in heaven and on earth and every tongue confess to be Savior of the world - who knows each and all of our names: long, short, or anywhere in between.

Tune in to this week's worship service - and invite your family and friends to celebrate His arrival into Jerusalem - in preparation for our salvation.



Welcome

Today, we encounter the paradox that defines our faith: Jesus Christ glorified as king and humiliated servant. We too are full of paradox. Like Peter, we desire to follow Christ but find ourselves afraid, denying God. We wave palms in celebration today as Christ comes into our midst - and follow with trepidation as His path leads to death on the cross and His broken body buried in a grave from which He was raised by God on the third day. This morning, we stand at the beginning of a week which is at the center of the church year, looking forward in anticipation toward the completion of God's astounding work.

Confession & Forgiveness

Pastor: Blessed be the holy Trinity, one God in three persons who is present, gives life and calls into existence all things for our benefit. **C**: Amen.

Pastor: If you were to keep watch over sins, O Lord, who could stand? Yet with you is grace and forgiveness for which reason we confess:

Cong: Gracious God have mercy on us. We confess that we have turned away from you, knowingly and unknowingly. We have wandered from your resurrection life. We have strayed from your love for all people. Turn us back to you, O God. Give us new hearts and right spirits that we may find what is pleasing to you and dwell in your house forever. Amen.

Pastor: Receive good news! God turns to you in love saying; "I will put my spirit in you, and you shall live. All your sins are forgiven through and in the name of Jesus Christ, who is the personification of God's free and abounding gift of grace and love for you. Amen

Reading of Processional Gospel

Matthew 21:1-11

When they had come near Jerusalem and had reached Bethphage at the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two disciples saying to them, "Go into the village ahead of you and you will find a donkey tied and a colt with her; untie them and bring them to me. If anyone says anything to you, just say this, 'The Lord needs them', and he will send them immediately". This took place to fulfill what had been spoken through the prophet, saying, "Tell the daughter of Zion look, your king is coming to you, humble, and mounted on a donkey, and on a colt, the foal of a donkey." The disciples went and did as Jesus had directed and they brought the donkey and the colt, put their cloaks on them and he sat on them. A very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road, and others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road. The crowds that went ahead of Jesus and those that followed Him were shouting, "Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest heaven!" When Jesus entered Jerusalem the whole city was in turmoil asking, "Who is this?" The crowds were saying, "This is the prophet Jesus from Nazareth in Galilee."

Pastor: Today churches everywhere remember Christ's entry into Jerusalem where he would be betrayed and die six days later on a Friday we call "good". As such, today's service is simultaneously mixed with joy and distress over that which Christ endured for us and for all people. We praise you, O God, for redeeming the

world through Jesus Christ who entered the holy city in triumph where he was proclaimed messiah and king by those who spread garments and branches along his way: "HOSANNA! BLESSED IS HE WHO COMES IN THE NAME OF THE LORD!"

When I Survey the Wondrous Cross

Gospel Matthew 27:11-54 Read by Pastor Illausky, Sue Illausky, Alex Kirton, Ceci Gunderson Now Jesus stood before the governor; and the governor asked him, "Are you the King of the Jews?" Jesus said, "You say so." But when he was accused by the chief priests and elders, he did not answer. Then Pilate said to him, "Do you not hear how many accusations they make against you?" But he gave him no answer, not even to a single charge, so that the governor was greatly amazed.

Now at the festival the governor was accustomed to release a prisoner for the crowd, anyone whom they wanted. At that time they had a notorious prisoner, called Jesus Barabbas. So after they had gathered, Pilate said to them, "Whom do you want me to release for you, Jesus Barabbas or Jesus who is called the Messiah?" For he realized that it was out of jealousy that they had handed him over. While he was sitting on the judgment seat, his wife sent word to him, "Have nothing to do with that innocent man, for today I have suffered a great deal because of a dream about him." Now the chief priests and the elders persuaded the crowds to ask for Barabbas and to have Jesus killed. The governor again said to them, "Which of the two do you want me to release for you?" And they said, "Barabbas." Pilate said to them, "Then what should I do with Jesus who is called the Messiah?" All of them said, "Let him be crucified!" Then he asked, "Why, what evil has he done?" But they shouted all the more, "Let him be crucified!"

So when Pilate saw that he could do nothing, but rather that a riot was beginning, he took some water and washed his hands before the crowd, saying, "I am innocent of this man's blood; see to it yourselves." Then the people as a whole answered, "His blood be on us and on our children!" So he released Barabbas for them; and after flogging Jesus, he handed him over to be crucified.

Then the soldiers of the governor took Jesus into the governor's headquarters, and they gathered the whole cohort around him. They stripped him and put a scarlet robe on him, and after twisting some thorns into a crown, they put it on his head. They put a reed in his right hand and knelt before him and mocked him, saying, "Hail, King of the Jews!" They spat on him, and took the reed and struck him on the head. After mocking him, they stripped him of the robe and put his own clothes on him. Then they led him away to crucify him.

As they went out, they came upon a man from Cyrene named Simon; they compelled this man to carry his cross. And when they came to a place called Golgotha (which means Place of a Skull), they offered him wine to drink, mixed with gall; but when he tasted it, he would not drink it. And when they had crucified him, they divided his clothes among themselves by casting lots; then they sat down there and kept watch over him. Over his head they put the charge against him, which read, "This is Jesus, the King of the Jews."

Then two bandits were crucified with him, one on his right and one on his left. Those who passed by derided him, shaking their heads and saying, "You who would destroy the temple and build it in three days, save yourself! If you are the Son of God, come down from the cross." In the same way the chief priests also, along with the scribes and elders, were mocking him, saying, "He saved others; he cannot save himself. He is the King of Israel; let him come down from the cross now, and we will believe in him. He trusts in God; let God deliver him now, if he wants to; for he said, 'I am God's Son.' "The bandits who were crucified with him also taunted him in the same way.

From noon on, darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon. And about three o'clock Jesus cried with a loud voice, "Eli, Eli, lema sabachthani?" that is, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" When some of the bystanders heard it, they said, "This man is calling for Elijah." At once one of them ran and got a sponge, filled it with sour wine, put it on a stick, and gave it to him to drink. But the others said, "Wait, let us see whether Elijah will come to save him." Then Jesus cried again with a loud voice and breathed his last. At that moment the curtain of the temple was torn in two, from top to bottom. The earth shook, and the rocks were split. The tombs also were opened, and many bodies of the saints who had fallen asleep were raised. After his resurrection they came out of the tombs and entered the holy city and appeared to many. Now when the centurion and those with him, who were keeping watch over Jesus, saw the earthquake and what took place, they were terrified and said, "Truly this man was God's Son!"
